

AGENCY SPOTLIGHT: VENTURA COUNTY LIBRARIES

Ventura County Library is a public library system of 12 community libraries across Ventura County. In addition to the standing locations, the library team has built out a mobile library, which visits members of the community in places that don't have access to one of the brick and mortar locations.

The Library is governed by the Ventura County Board of Supervisors and was organized in 1916. At the time of its centennial in 2016, the system provided access to 412,715 physical volumes and more than 500,000 virtual items to its nearly 300,000 cardholders. Since then, its reach has only grown! The library team continues to expand community programming beyond books to feature services such as musical instrument rentals, digital navigators, and homework centers. The mission of the Library is "Inspiring our community to explore, discover, and connect."

Ventura County Libraries will be hosting its first annual Celebration of Books on September 30th on the CSUCI campus. This exciting event will celebrate the literary world and will feature author Javier Zamora, who will talk about his book Solito: A Memoir. Solito was the 2023 selection by Ventura County Libraries for the One County, One Book program.

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SELF-CARE FOR MANAGERS

A FRIENDLY REMINDER TO OUR READERS!

The Management Council would like to remind our managers across the County to take a moment to reflect on the topic of self care. What is self care? What does it look like when you're in a management role?

The term "self-care" probably brings to mind dimly-lit moments of relaxation or maybe a morning run—and that's not necessarily wrong. But there's a lot more to it than that. Self-care is about doing right by yourself and being your own personal advocate for your well-being.

As a manager, if you try to stay in performance mode 24/7, your effectiveness diminishes over time. But if you invest in your recovery—if you take care of yourself—you're available and effective for your job and your people.

A consistent self-care regime can help you:

- Regulate your energy levels and build resilience, making you better able to handle the stresses of life and work.
- Become more consistent in your leadership, instead of letting moods affect how you work with others.
- Set a good example for your people, modeling the things you need them to do for themselves.
- Get more done, to a higher standard, achieving your objectives with less friction and inefficiency.

Self-care isn't a switch you flip on and off. It's a commitment and a journey. Here are some steps to getting going on yours:

- Decide that **self-care is important**. Make a commitment to yourself.
- Identify the self-care behaviors that **work for you**. Reflect on what you value and need in your everyday life and during times of high stress.
- Address the blockers. What's getting in the way of you being able to take proper care of yourself?
- Acknowledge **when to delegate and when to seek assistance.** Show your vulnerability, ask for help, and let go of the idea of perfection. No one really thinks you're superhuman anyway!
- Embrace the **power of the micro-break.** Self-care routines don't have to take hours. Small moments can make big differences. Mix it up.
- Keep monitoring and reviewing your well-being. If something isn't working for you, don't continue just because you think it's what you should do.

INTEGRITY

Awarded to a person who is noted for his/her honesty, openness, forthrightness, doing the right thing, honoring commitments, etc.

Awarded to a person who is noted for his/her commitment to nurturing, supporting, guiding, and training of new team members (including new staff, encouraging their success in the art and career of public sector service.

RISING STAR
